Sanitary Sewer Overflows reported by MAWSS because of Hurricane Nate

MOBILE, Alabama — Mobile Area Water and Sewer System (MAWSS) experienced multiple sanitary sewer overflows as a result of the heavy rain and flooding from Hurricane Nate that occurred on October 7. Below are the locations, estimated amounts and receiving waters.

All seafood harvested in this general area should be thoroughly cooked before eating. People should wash hands after cleaning seafood and before preparing food.

MAWSS reports broken force main causes Sanitary Sewer Overflow

MOBILE, Alabama — Mobile Area Water and Sewer System (MAWSS) experienced a Sanitary Sewer Overflow on October 8. Approximately 700 gallons overflowed into Hamilton Creek near 9570 Estate Drive S. because of a break in a force main. MAWSS crews are making the necessary repairs.

Dr. Bernard H. Eichold II, Health Officer for the Mobile County Health Department, advises area residents to take precautions when coming into contact with any standing water that may have accumulated as a result of these overflows. Those who have come into direct contact with untreated sewage are advised to wash their hands and clothing thoroughly.

Area residents should take precautions when using Hamilton Creek for recreational purposes because of the overflow. All seafood harvested in this general area should be thoroughly cooked before eating. People should wash hands after cleaning seafood and before preparing food.

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
